



Cherry Tree Border

In the middle of Harbour View and using a mature hedgerow and a group of old Oak trees as a background, Cherry Tree Border offers plots in both the Woodland and the Purbeck View charge rate.

Only cremated remains plots are available. Cremated remains can also be scattered along this border.

Along the hedgerow, benches and Cherry Trees form a line from which a view of Purbeck can be enjoyed. The hedgerow merges into the mature woodland adding the benefit of spring Daffodils and Bluebells to the blossom of the Cherry Trees.





Trokes Border

Forming a small border area between open woodland and a boundary line of mature trees, Trokes Border offers plots for cremated remains at the Woodland charge rate. Cremated remains can also be scattered on this border.

Being located close to a cluster of Magnolia trees, Trokes Border is particularly attractive in Spring as the abundance of Daffodils in bloom complement the blossom of the trees. Bird and insect life are particularly notable in this area and benches are available for visitors who wish to sit and take in the surroundings.

Trokes Border is a quiet and peaceful area served by a grass pathway from the lodge car park, through woodland and meadow, offering the visitor a picturesque walk of 3 or 4 minutes.





The Orchard

Still in its infancy, the Orchard is a small section, in the middle of Harbour View, bordered by a gravel pathway and a mature hedgerow. It appears a little more formal than other more open areas. Planted with a variety of fruit trees the Orchard promises to be an area of great beauty as it matures.

The Orchard looks out over open ground and the Harbour View pond, which is visited by ducks and wading birds. In 2008 two nests of ducklings were raised.

The Orchard offers cremated remains plots at woodland charge rate and cremated remains can be scattered along the hedgerow border.





Bluebell Walk

An area of ancient woodland to which we offer limited access due to the fragile nature of its environment. Coming into its own in late spring, as its name suggests, the section is a carpet of Bluebells. Cremated remains may be scattered along the border of the Bluebell Walk. No burial plots are available in this section.

This section is generally left to nature; very little maintenance is provided. Visitors need to be prepared for uneven and slippery ground but with patience, will be rewarded with a beautiful unspoilt environment.
